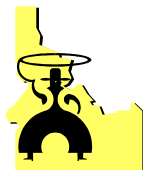

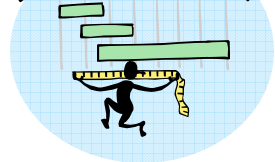


It's Departmental Roundup Time again!

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Brent Reinke becomes Director effective January 1, 2007.

The Board of Correction selected **Brent Reinke** as the new leader of the Idaho Department of Correction in a special Board meeting held Friday, December 22. The announcement came just two days after **Vaughn Killeen** announced his resignation effective December 31. Reinke will take over the position on January 1, 2007.

Reinke comes to the Department after nearly ten years of service as Director of the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections. Prior to that, Reinke was a Twin Falls County Commissioner and private business owner.

Board of Correction chair **Robin Sandy** stated, "We are fortunate to have someone with outstanding abilities within Idaho step up to take on the challenging position of director of corrections."

In accepting the Board's offer, Reinke was complimentary of the direction the Department was heading under the leadership of Director Vaughn Killeen, "I am excited about the new challenges and look forward to working with an outstanding staff in carrying on the important work of the department," Reinke said.

Outgoing Director Killeen says he's pleased with the decision and knows Reinke will move the agency in the right direction. "I am very happy with the Board's selection of Brent Reinke as Director. I trust he will move the agency forward and can describe him as a stand-up guy who will provide a 100% commitment to the Department."

Newly appointed Reinke will have a busy schedule when he begins work in January. In Reinke's first month as Director, he will deliver the Department's budget request to the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, as well as lead lawmakers on a tour of IDOC facilities located south of Boise.

Director Killeen Thanks Staff

In an email to staff sent on December 20, Vaughn Killeen thanked IDOC employees for the significant progress made at the Department of Correction during his time as Director. Killeen said, "I believe deeply in the mission of this department and the skill and professionalism of each and every one of you." He also noted the accomplishments made at IDOC over the past five months. "We have added beds in the system, reduced turnover, created a new probation and parole process, and come together in collaborative efforts to develop a more responsive and efficient agency." He emphasized his appreciation to staff. "Most importantly, I would like to thank the men and women of the Department of Correction for a job well done. I have been impressed by your commitment to the mission of the department and have been honored to work with you."



Killeen sent a final letter to lawmakers that included a planning document created to address future growth. He said in his email, "The letter reminds lawmakers of your hard work and the challenges ahead as prison growth continues. I ask that you work with the new leadership to carry out the Department of Correction's important mission to protect the public."

Newly appointed Director **Brent Reinke** takes over on January 1, 2007.

CPM Graduation Boasts Six IDOC Employees

Congratulations to the six IDOC employees who graduated this month as Certified Public Managers!

The course is managed by the Division of Human Resources and is for public sector managers and supervisors in Idaho. Most people who participate in the course are recommended by their supervisors. Graduate **Brian Underwood**, warden at PWCC, described the course this way, "CPM (Certified Public Manager) is an intensive long-term training that helps develop leaders in State Government. It includes class lectures, papers and a major project."

The program requires 300 hours of instruction and assignments over 30-36 months. Most participants complete the program in addition to working full-time jobs. The major project component of the course takes approximately 12 to 18 months to complete. Course participants create and carry out concepts or new programs that provide a benefit to their agency. For example, **Kim Spevak**, Senior PO in District 5, developed and conducted an audit on the Emergency Preparedness of Field Officers, using a grant from the National Institute of Corrections and assistance from Robert Thorton of the Community Corrections Institute. Graduate **Pat Donaldson**, Buildings Operations Manager at Central Office, coordinated a statewide assessment on outstanding maintenance needs at all IDOC facilities. From this information, the Department will be able to prioritize and plan for maintenance needs more efficiently and effectively. All of the graduates completed projects on top of maintaining their current work load.

Idaho's Interstate Compact Team Plans for 2007

BOISE-Idaho's Interstate Compact team held their annual meeting in November to review the past year and gear up for changes in the compact that are coming for 2007. **Judy Mesick**, Idaho's Interstate Compact Deputy Administrator, told the meeting "Idaho's goal is to transfer offenders to a place where they will succeed on parole."

In 2000, **Senator Denton Darrington** spearheaded the effort to move the new compact to law in Idaho. He says, "[Idaho was] the first legislature to pass the law and the second state to enact it. My heart is in this. I truly believe in it."

There is an \$18,000 fee Idaho pays for compact costs. Senator Darrington says that's a small price to pay for the increased public safety. He said, "\$18,000 is dirt cheap for the safety that's afforded as a result of this compact."

The biggest change that came about this year dealt with issuing warrants. Previously, warrants were issued for Idaho and surrounding states. New this year, all warrants will now be effective nationwide. **Kevin Kempf**, Division of Community Corrections Chief and Compact Administrator, acknowledged during the meeting that the change in warrants could potentially create cost issues for smaller counties in Idaho and the Parole Commission, where budgets are smaller. He emphasized the compact's commitment to providing probation and parole any help needed to bring absconders back to Idaho and to keep communities safe.

Another discussion point during the meeting dealt with compact compliance. Idaho's Interstate Compact takes compliance with compact laws very seriously. At this year's national meeting, Texas and Pennsylvania were both fined for non-compliance. Judy Mesick stated that Idaho takes aggressive steps in training and educating officers about compact rules and regulations in order to avoid fines (like those issued to the other states this year) and other consequences.



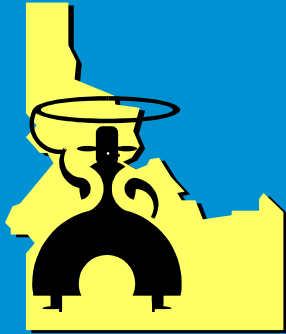

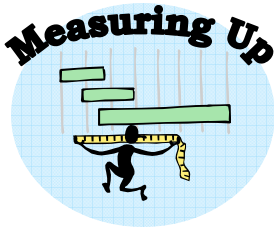

Comparing IDOC to Other Western States

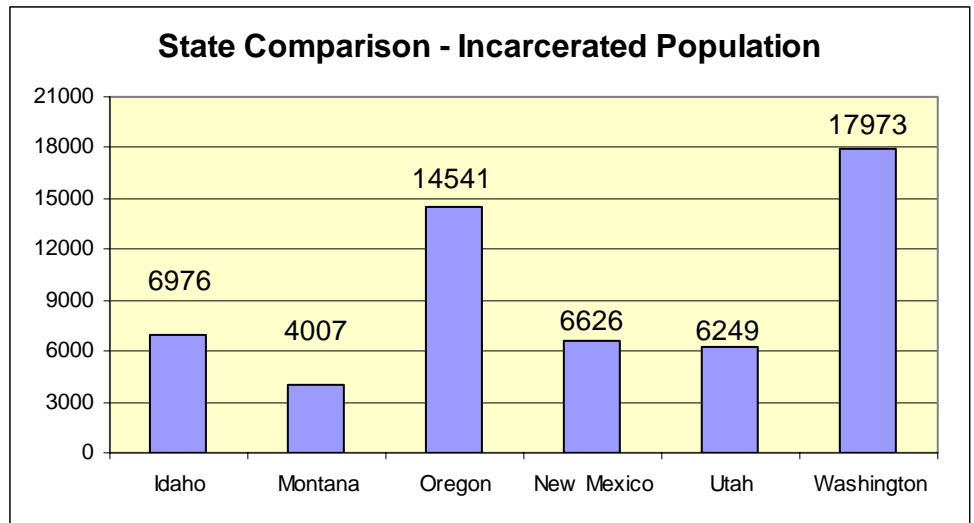
This is the first in an on-going series called "Measuring Up" that will be appearing in DOC Talk. "Measuring Up" will help educate IDOC employees about current trends or analysis of information within our department, or how we compare with other western states, including Utah, Wyoming, Montana, Washington and Oregon.

This month will look at how Idaho measures up with other western states in population and budget.

This month, we're taking a look two different comparisons. The first chart compares each state's incarcerated population.

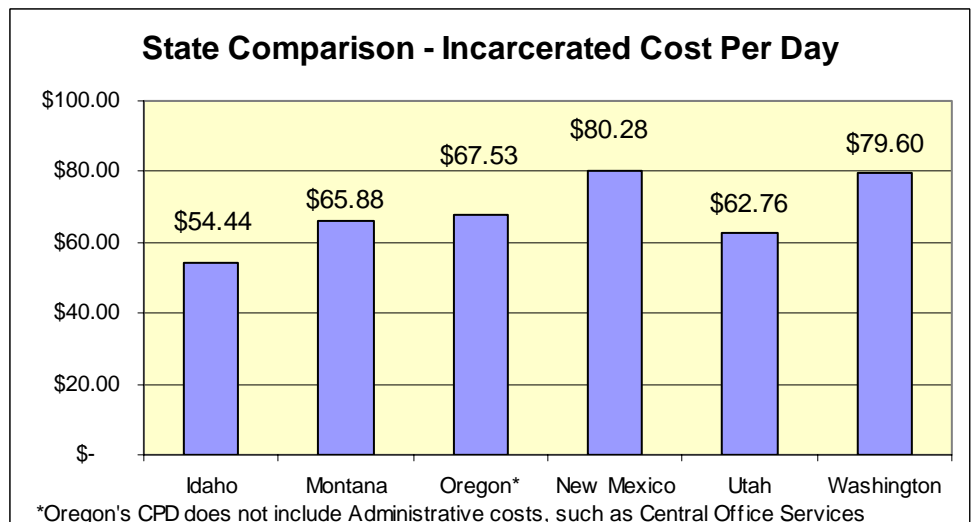
Incarcerated Populations

Washington is the highest, with almost 18,000 inmates. Oregon is a close second with just under 15,000 inmates. Idaho (6,976 inmates), New Mexico (6,626 inmates) and Utah (6,249 inmates) come in next. Montana has the smallest incarcerated population with just over 4,000 inmates.



Cost-per-day Comparison

Chart #2 compares the same states' cost-per-day. New Mexico has the highest cost-per-day at just over \$80/day. This is an interesting fact, considering New Mexico is in the bottom-half of the states as far as population numbers are concerned. (It should be noted that Oregon's cost-per-day figures do **not** include administrative costs, such as Central Office services.)



Idaho's Numbers

The Idaho Department of Correction is leading it's neighboring states in keeping cost-per-day numbers low.

Out of the six states compared, Idaho has the **lowest** cost-per-day at just \$54.44.
