Who We Are and What We Do

The Idaho Department of Correction's **mission** is to protect the public, our staff and those within our custody and supervision through safety, accountability, partnerships and providing opportunities for offender change. The department's **vision** is focused on 1) care and development of staff; 2) sound security practices; and 3) a reentry system that enhances public safety. The agency's **values** embrace integrity, positive attitude and respect.

The Idaho Department of Correction (IDOC) is organized into three divisions: 1) prisons; 2) probation and parole; and 3) management services.

PRISONS DIVISION

The Prisons Division manages inmates in nine state correctional institutions, providing institutional safety services and management of special projects. The division is also responsible for inmate placement, education, and treatment services to the inmate population.

PROBATION AND PAROLE DIVISION

The Probation and Parole Division supervises probationers and parolees living in Idaho's seven districts. The division manages 22 probation and parole offices, as well as felons on Interstate Compact. The division also manages four community reentry centers, reentry services, community-based substance abuse treatment, and provides pre-sentence investigation reports to the courts.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES


The Management Services Division has oversight over information technology, fiscal, budget and policy, contract services, and purchasing. Capital construction, central records, contract compliance, and health care services for prison facilities and county jails are also included.

IN ADDITION

In addition to the above core divisions, the Director's Office manages the functions of Human Resources, Victims' Services, Communications, Evaluation and Compliance, Office of Constituent Services, Public Information Officer (PIO), and the Sex Offender Management Board. The director and deputy director also provide oversight to Special Investigations and, and Correctional Industries (a self-funded inmate training program established as a separate agency).

FY2017 Admissions and Releases (Average per Month)













Challenges and What's Ahead



Agency Goal #1: Protect the public, staff and offenders. Where possible, the Idaho Department of Correction seeks to apply the Principle of Normality within its facilities. By presenting offenders with the kinds of normal choices and responsibilities law-abiding citizens face daily, and in a less-restrictive environment when appropriate, the department seeks to prepare offenders for their successful return to society. The Principle of Normality is a safety initiative. It is the practice of showing and teaching inmates what normal, healthy life looks like. It creates better neighbors, safer communities, and more effective rapport between the agency's populations and staff.

Agency Goal #2: Enhance staff success and wellness. Care and concern for staff is a top priority for IDOC. The agency wants it's employees to be aware and have easy access to resources which are currently available and may benefit them in work and family life. These resources include:

Agency Goal #3: Modernize our technology. The Management Services Division is moving forward with a new Offender Management System (OMS). The project hit a milestone in July 2017 when the request for the project funding was written and approved by the IDOC's leadership team. This request to the legislature will be the highest priority for the department in the next budget cycle. The project team has estimated the new OMS project costs from July 2018 - June 2021 to be \$15.5 million.

The Inmate Dog Alliance Project of Idaho (IDAPI): The IDAPI Program was started in August 2004 by the Idaho Humane Society (IHS) in cooperation with the Idaho Department of Correction (IDOC). Dogs are trained for 8-10 weeks and are taught basic obedience, numerous tricks and are crate and house trained. At the end of the training period, they are adopted via an application process facilitated by IHS. Over 1,600 dogs have completed the training for the IDAPI program with approximately 150 graduating per year. Institutions that are currently participating in the IDAPI Program include Idaho State Correctional Center (ISCC), Idaho Maximum Security Institution (IMSI), and Idaho State Correctional Institution (ISCI).





Mentor training continues to be scheduled throughout the state and recruitment is always ongoing. As part of a new IDOC initiative called <u>Free2Succeed</u>, mentors help provide a "bridge" for new offenders who are returning to Idaho's communities from incarceration. The goal of Free2Succeed is to provide offenders who are willing to participate in the program with a mentor who will work with them side-by-side to ensure a smooth and successful transition and help reduce the chance of recidivism.

IDOC's restrictive housing reform continues to make progress. South Idaho Correctional Institution has eliminated their segregation beds. In doing so, they repurposed some positions in order to increase the K-9 program. Idaho Maximum Security Institution has eliminated 120 segregation cells and converted them to double-bunk closed-custody general population cells. Idaho State Correctional Center has created a transition tier where inmates from the South Boise Complex, who test positive for a controlled substance, will live. The number of restrictive housing and administrative segregation beds have decreased from 524 in 2015 to 368 in 2017.
